In March, John Heath of Our Neighborhood Voices provided an update of local and state legislation affecting communities in the Los Angeles metropolitan area.


He also invited retirees to participate in the efforts of his organization to persuade elected officials to consult with community leaders and homeowners before passing bills that impact our neighborhoods.

Saint Barnabas Senior Services detailed the many services and supports that the program provides to seniors. Like all senior services their organization switched to virtual presentations and food delivery programs.

Grace Yoo Public Affairs Specialist, St. Barnabas Senior Services presented on the California Seniors Master Plan on Aging. This was a statewide effort to plan for seniors over the next 5 years.

After hearing that many seniors and community members were struggling with

the COVID shutdown, we recruited Chidi R. Njoku, LCSW director for Behavioral Health Kaiser Permanente South Bay.

His engaging topic was "Let's Talk about Mental Health." He provided our members with positive coping skills and guidance on managing our emotions.

With the increase in long term fires, we invited Deisy M. Gonzalez, the emergency management coordinator for the City of Los Angeles. She completed a presentation on earthquakes and disasters.

Our members received a workbook to help engage them in the training and provide the steps to prepare for an emergency.

Elizabeth Fuller, the chief consultant for the Assembly Committee on Aging and Long-term Care, spoke on the need for having long term care insurance or a program for the state to address that need for our middle-income families that have a pension and are not eligible for state run program.

Our final program was a presentation by Ardis Shubin, community services specialist with the HELP group - Healthcare and Elder Law Programs. She gave a dynamic presentation on Caregiving Stages and options.

Finally, we ended the year with a fun virtual party playing bingo and spinning the wheel of gifts.

BEWARE DECEPTIVE FRIEND REQUESTS

Social Media Safety Tips

Social media has become a prime target for scammers in recent years. Beyond sensationalized photo and video posts that lure unsuspecting viewers to click on an item for the juicy details, fraudsters have a more despicable technique to extract personal information from social media users – impersonating members of the military.

Facebook Friend Scam

A friend of mine recently received a friend request on Facebook from someone she didn't know. She perused the personal page of this individual and saw that he posted a profile picture of a gentleman in a U.S. Army uniform next to a military Humvee. The header on this page also displayed a group of men in uniform posing for a photo. In a message he sent to her along with his friend request, he claimed to be a Captain General in the U.S. Army.

His biggest mistake wasn't the one you probably have in mind. The rank Captain General is non-existent in the U.S. Army, and anyone claiming to be one has never served. While this is a dead giveaway, his biggest mistake was telling her that his name was something contrary to the embroidered name on his uniform. Also visible on the uniform also was the rank of Sergeant First Class (SFC). The real SFC in

the photo will always outrank and outclass a shameful Captain General scammer any day of the week.

Besides these glaring errors, there's another giveaway that should have anyone turning down this friend request. The requesting individual has only eight friends. For someone with such few friends to have located and made contact with my friend without any prior contact or acquaintances in common is extremely unlikely. The best course of action to take when you receive a friend request from someone you don't know is to turn down the request. If you're not sure about your affiliation with

In Sub-Committee Offers Home Safety Checklist for Seniors

How to reduce falls in the home:

Did you know falls are the leading cause of fatal injury and the most common cause of nonfatal trauma-related hospital admissions among older adults? So how can you help your parents make their home fallsafe?

First, you can address the fall risks in the home, room by room.

Home Entrance:

Do they have a front porch?

How is the lighting?

Do they have a sturdy railing for the

Are there cracks that need to be leveled? How is the lighting in the front entrance?

Does furniture block a clear entry?

Is there a rug at the door? Is it secure on a non-stick mat?

Living Room:

Are there rugs that can cause someone to slip or trip?

Are there phone cables or power cords in walkways?

Are there clear walkways?

Is there enough room to maneuver the room? Is the coffee table too close to the table or is there enough room to get around a side table?

Are the floorboards or carpeting loose?

Carpet can stretch and sag over the years, making it easy to trip.

Is there ample lighting in the room? Bedroom:

Is there ample lighting?

Is there a clear pathway from your bed to the door?

Are there rugs? Make sure they are secure.

Are there phone cords or TV cables in walkways?

Keep a flashlight in your nightstand in case there is a power outage.

Bathrooms:

Install grab bars in the bathtub or shower and next to the toilet.

Clean up water spills immediately.

Place non-skid mats on surfaces that


Add commodes to help with standing. Add a shower bench to prevent falls. General Household Tips:

Make sure all walkways are clear.

Keep frequently used items easily accessible to avoid overreaching or dizziness after bending.

Arrange furniture so there is sufficient room to move around and clear pathways of newspapers, magazines or boxes.

Consider purchasing furniture that is an adequate height to make getting in and



out of a chair easier.

Put nightlights in each room so that no room is completely dark.

Add a comfortable reclining lift chair to eliminate falls that occur from trying to stand up with weak muscles

Of course, ensuring the home is as safe as possible is just the first step in fall prevention. We'll look at health risks that can increase falls in a later post. Have you tackled your parent's space to make it fall safe? What was the most surprising obstacle?

Use of a non-existent rank in the military

Claiming an identity other than what a photo indicates

The individual has few if any friends

Neither you nor

Smartphone Tips for Grandparents

Today's technology can be intimidating to those who grew up with rotary phones and black-and-white televisions, but that shouldn't be a reason for seniors to steer clear of smartphones. These devices are a great way for grandparents to keep in touch with family and friends and can be excellent tools for monitoring health and preserving independence. These simple tips can help first-time users get comfortable with their new device.

Choose the right device

The type of device you choose will have a big impact on how easy your phone is to use. A common issue for seniors is dealing with tiny type on a small screen.

Choose a phone with a screen size of at least 6 inches. If you have trouble with touch screens, opt for a device like the Samsung Galaxy Note that comes with a stylus.

Select a phone that friends and family members are familiar with so they can help with set-up (often the most complicated part of using a smartphone) and troubleshooting.
